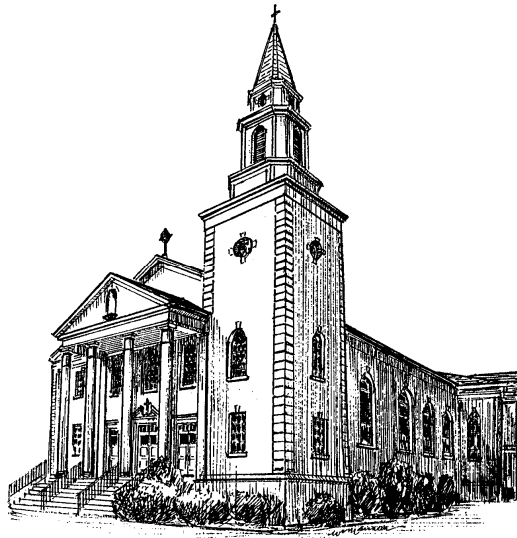

Deacon John Sylvester

Last Sunday, October 7, Cardinal Tobin presided at the noon Mass at the Cathedral Basilica of the Sacred Heart in Newark. The 50th anniversary of the reinstatement of the Permanent Diaconate was commemorated at this Mass. Approximately 80 of the 151 Permanent Deacons of the Archdiocese attended.

The Permanent Diaconate existed from the time of the apostles (Act 6:1-6). One of the first deacons, Stephen, was the first martyr of the Church, being stoned to death because of his preaching (Acts 6-7).

Since early times deacons were the assistants to the Bishops, serving as their “eyes and ears.” During the first 1,000 years of the Church it was not unusual for a deacon to be elected pope.

Around the Middle Ages the diaconate became a way station for those to be ordained priests, and the Permanent Diaconate in the Latin Rite Church generally ceased to exist. In the Eastern and Orthodox Churches the Permanent Diaconate continued.

Vatican II re-established the Permanent Diaconate, and in 1972 Pope Paul VI issued guidelines on how this was to happen. In 1975 the Archdiocese of Newark ordained the first class of 77 men to the diaconate.

The deacon’s role varies from place to place and parish to parish. Some are involved in prison or hospital ministry. Some run parishes in those parts of the country where there is a shortage of priests. Some are involved in ministry to the deaf, the blind, the homeless. My own ministries at St. Mary’s include baptismal preparation, chairing the Social Justice committee, the biannual trip to the Food Bank, bringing communion to the homebound and occasionally performing wake and committal services in addition to service at the altar during Mass.

During the seven years since my ordination I have found this to be very rewarding and challenging. I’m always happy to talk to anyone who would like to know more about this ministry.

The Issues

Environment

The earth is God’s gift to us. Care for the environment represents a challenge for all of humanity. It is a matter of a common and universal duty, that of respecting a common good, destined for all, by preventing anyone from using ‘with impunity the different categories of beings, whether living or inanimate—animals, plants, the natural elements— simply as one wishes, according to one’s own economic needs.’¹ “The environment is God’s gift to everyone, and in our use of it we have a responsibility.”²

Healthcare

Health care is an essential good for every human person. In a society like ours, no one should lack access to decent health care.³

Health is not a consumer good, but rather a universal right, and therefore access to health care services cannot be a privilege.”⁴

War

The amount of money spent annually on war exceeds 1.7 trillion dollars, 41% of which is spent by the United States. What if an equal amount was spent in securing peace? “Justice, then, right reason and consideration for human dignity and life urgently demand that the arms race should cease, that the stockpiles which exist in various countries should be reduced equally and simultaneously by the parties concerned, that nuclear weapons should be banned, and finally that all come to an agreement on a fitting program of disarmament, employing mutual and effective controls.”⁵

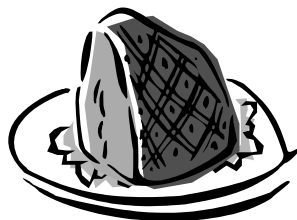

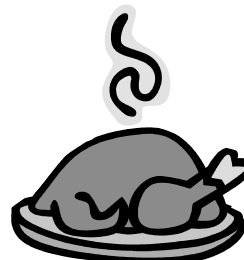
Thanksgiving Baskets
